Subject Overview:

This diplomatic practice and international event course aim to prepare students to be able to understand about the definition of diplomacy, the history of the development of diplomacy, the modern practice of diplomacy, the way diplomacy is conducted and discover the format of diplomacy as well as present the international diplomatic events in the modern era.

Course Objectives

After completing this "diplomatic practice and international event" course, students are expected to be able to:
