Subject Title : Foreign Policy of Indonesia

**Subject Specification**: For students in International Relations Communication

Subject Overview :

The Indonesian Foreign Policy Course is a compulsory subject for undergraduate students of Communication International Relations of LSPR Institute of Communication & Business. The determination of this course as a Compulsory Course because the International Relations is a discipline that studies relations between countries. According to the UNESCO Decree of 1947, the scope of International Relations is composed of: First, International Politics which consists of two main components, namely Foreign Policy and Diplomacy; Second, International Law; and Third, International Organization and Administration. Based on the scope mentioned above, it can be seen that Foreign Policy is the main subject in International Relations. Meanwhile, Indonesian Foreign Policy is an important topic for international relations students in Indonesia. This course will study Indonesia's foreign policy from the time of the first President of Indonesia, President Soekarno to the current President of Indonesia, President Joko Widodo by means of periodization to generalize the patterns of challenges, opportunities, and threats in each leadership period.

# Course Objectives

At the completion of this course, students are expected to:

- 1. Explains two tools of foreign policy, namely war and diplomacy and how to implement diplomacy to achieve foreign policy goals by avoiding war. (1) Implementation of the use of diplomacy to achieve foreign policy objectives, (2) Theories of success and failure of the implementation of foreign policy, (3) Theories of foreign policy for developing countries.
- 2. Defend arguments in academic forums in evaluating Indonesian foreign policy vis-s-vis the international environment and contemporary international relations issues.
- 3. Build Indonesian leadership ideas in international and multicultural interactions.
- 4. Create patterns of challenges, opportunities, and threats to Indonesia's foreign policy.
- 5. Analyze the role of Indonesia in international forums since the struggle for independence era to the present era (2022).
- 6. Evaluate government solutions or policies in achieving national interest

#### Course Method

The learning method of this course is combination of several Teaching-Learning Methods, such as the lecture method (one-way), class discussion (two-way), and student-centered learning (students learn on how to make collaboration, cooperation, and discussion about problem solving with their class mates). The method to be used is face-to-face (offline learning) with a total of 14 meetings. Learning Outcome (Competence)
