Subject Overview: Brief description of MK The International Relations Studies course is designed to introduce students to studying International Relations. The complexity of interactions between countries and non-state actors must be studied, primarily when closely related to current global life. This course aims to train students to view an international phenomenon from the paradigm of the International Relations discipline and train them to carry out an analysis of this phenomenon. In the short term, this course aims to direct students to determine the scope of international relations studies and its differences from other social and political science studies.

Course Objectives: Provide students with a comprehensive understanding of the complex interactions and dynamics shaping the international system, including political, economic, social, and cultural factors. Moreover, students are introduced to theoretical approaches in international relations, including realism, liberalism, constructivism, and critical theory, and encourage critical engagement with these perspectives.

Course Method: The course will be conducted through interactive learning, it will consist of class discussion, students presentation, quiz, case study analysis, paper, assignment and exams.

Learning Outcome (Competence) :

- Knowledge : Know and understand basic theories and concepts of

international relations.

- Skill : Able to carry out explanatory and predictive analysis and synthesis of phenomena in international relations

- Attitude : Have sensitivity and concern for friends and the learning environment, respect and be tolerant of existing diversity.
